

With Florica, Alexandra, Adriana and Luiza








We leave Bucharest with Luiza and Lavinia from the Roma Education Fund. We are in the midst of an epidemic, with 400 people dying every day from Covid.



Before I was 21, I didn't know anything about Roma history. My grandfather used to tell me: "You are Gypsy, you can't have high hopes for your life".





Gypsy in Romanian is an insult, it means dirty. The word does not exist in Romani but some Roma have integrated it, they see themselves as such.









Wide avenues, boulevards, motorway and national road through the Romanian agricultural plains: 120 kilometres in a straight line to Slobozia and the Roma district of Bora. Luiza lives in Bucharest, she is Roma and is preparing a thesis in anthropology on the representation of Roma in cinema. Lavinia is not Roma, they work together.

The discussion with Luiza is fascinating. She reminds us that the Roma were slaves and serfs in Romania for 500 years, until the abolition in 1856. A history that is not taught in school.

Her organization, as well as other Roma organizations, are heavily influenced by African Americans' civil rights struggles. She has chosen to work on the image of Roma in film because she does not recognize herself in either negative or positive Roma exoticism.


How are you today?

In Slobozia, Florica Alecu is the headmistress of the school in Bora, a so-called mixed neighbourhood because it has as many Roma families as non-Roma families. She is a mentor for the Roma Education Fund.

Supported by the Soros Foundation and the Danish company Velux in Romania, Slovakia and Hungary, the organisation sets up mentoring programmes for young Roma students, about 200










A mentor is a role model who works with the mentee to develop themselves. They help them to gain confidence and support, and act as a link to the training school. Florica is Roma, she is an example in the neighbourhood because of her background and her personality, she is a central figure so that young Roma who have become teachers can in turn be emancipating examples.







I started as a mediator, then I was a teacher and now I am a director. There are many things to do for the community.

When I was young, I wanted to be different, to have better living conditions. Our family was poor.

My brother became an officer in the army, he also became a famous writer. He was my mentor, my role model.





Florica wants non-Roma parents to send their children here because of the quality of education. She is against segregation, she prefers mixed classes. Out of 180 children, 60 identify themselves as Roma.



School drop-out is our big problem. Children lack role models. As for me, over time I realised that I was a strong woman.

I even got married to a Romanian, for contrast! But when my daughter was born, before I even saw her, I asked if she had black skin! I knew she would be discriminated because of her dark skin.

> Later I told her that she had to be nicer than the others because she was a Gypsy.



When I ask Florica if the issue of low self-esteem is related to the negative image of Roma in society, she replies: 'I think I don't want to believe it'. And Luiza, who is translating the conversation, tells me as an aside: 'Mrs Alecu is not answering your question. The link is obvious, otherwise why did she ask the midwife if her daughter was black?



The city of Slobozia has 100,000 inhabitants and the district of Bora, located on the outskirts like the vast majority of Roma districts in Romania, has 10,000.

According to Florica's deputy, 50% of Roma people in Bora work in businesses, shops and services, and 50% are day labourers in agriculture. She does not describe it as a poor neighbourhood.
























Now my daughter is a fighter. She is going to be a soldier, like her uncle. I am proud of her.



We rush off with Florica to the pedagogical high school where the mentoring programme has enabled nine girls from Slobozia to become teachers this year. We go to meet the headmistress, Adriana, and the teachers.



Thank you for receiving us despite the epidemic, it's nice.



























I grew up with my Roma neighbours, I played with them, I don't see them as different people. I don't even know if "different" is the right word.

The fact that Florica is Roma was important to them. She gives better advice than I do.






She does everything with her heart, it's essential to help like that.






In the programme, Florica is in contact with Adriana, the teachers, the young people and the families. Two tutor teachers, Alicia and Adriana, helped the students in maths and language.



Mirabella did not live with her parents but in a host family.




She had no knowledge of maths and passed all her exams with good marks.

At this school, about 60 students are trained each year to become teachers, including 4-6 Roma students outside the Velux programme. Adriana tells me that those who come here are the students who have done best in their high schools. The mentoring programme turns this logic on its head and gives other students a chance.

The girls' results are good, it worked well for them.


Some non–Roma students even asked for the mentoring programme for them...

One of the girls, Alexandra, I saw her as a student at school and now she is a teacher, she talks to me like a colleague!


The teachers treated me as an equal.










We are becoming film actresses...Howareyou?

I worked a lot, I was forced to have the best results.

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


Florica was always there, right to the end. She still advises me today.


> Do you feel good at school?



Florica is full of empathy and energy. She has to speak loudly, do a lot to convince. She has the feeling that it will never be enough. She takes us outside where she has organised for us a small meeting between the Roma children of the school and Alexandra. The meeting is non-formal but the idea is always the same: to set an example, to show models, to affirm that something is possible and that the future is not closed.

I learned here, like you. I had the opportunity to become a teacher with the programme, and I took it.

Alexandra succeeded because she did everything for it.



I really thank you for what you are doing in the programme.


